NC Public Health Association Conference a Big Success

The NC Public Health Association Conference celebrated the Oral Health Section's 100th birthday in style. A few highlights from sessions that could help us improve children's oral health in WNC:

We heard about the Oral Health Section's work to build a collaborative practice between dental providers and medical providers to improve care for



women during pregnancy. A new **Perinatal Oral Health Collaborative Framework** was released. The goals is to **strengthen medical-dental collaborative practice to improve maternal oral health to help babies have a good start in life**. Did you know that pregnancy complications have been linked to oral bacteria that has been located within the amniotic fluid? And that most young children acquire caries-

causing bacteria from their mothers, so a mother's poor oral health will likely cause the child to have poor oral health.

The American Dental Association **Community Dental Health Coordinator** curriculum is being taught by Alamance Community College to dental assistants and dental hygienists as continuing education. These new dental positions are to help community members find the care they need. Those that have hired CDHCs have seen their no show rates for appointments drop significantly. And community members have a trusted community member to help them navigate the system.

The Division of Public Health's Oral Health Section unveiled their **Oral Health Snapshots** that give us key oral health data by region. These snapshots will be on the OHS website in mid-January.
